There was a discussion regarding consulting members to a greater degree before responding to planning applications and publishing commentary. A big thank you to all who made the extra effort to support the **Village Shop** which was under threat of closing – please continue to visit the shop, so we may secure its future going forward.

The **Book of Hurst** continues to be available and is a perfect gift for existing Hurst residents and those with an interest in village life – dare we say, an ideal and unique Christmas present if you are looking for something a little different?

We are keen to grow the **membership of HVS**, so we hope to see an increase over the coming months. We are pleased to confirm the annual fee remains at £5.00 for members. A membership application form can be found on the back of this newsletter.

What is HVS?

In 1972, 12 residents including the then Vicar and Annette Drake, got together and created HVS to fight against the threat to the village from the Gravel extraction in the Loddon Valley. Dinton Pastures has turned out to be a lovely community asset and not the feared overdeveloped park that was originally proposed. But the founders' fears should nonetheless be kept in mind to help prevent Dinton becoming overdeveloped.

50 years on, HVS has evolved through various phases of emphasis including for example tree planting to community engagement, while always keeping an eye on planning.

HVS is not part of the Hurst Parish Council and regularly people are confused by this. The independence of HVS and its mission statement is very important: "The object of the society shall be to preserve and enhance the character of the Parish of Hurst as a living community".

Communication: The website is the main source of information for members and residents, along with our newsletters and Facebook. We post every letter we write on our website. Every planning submission and every communication with a statutory body, such as the Parish Council is posted.

Hurst Village Pubs - A Rich History

In Hurst we are lucky to have 6 pubs, all providing excellent food and drink options. Please support these pubs over the Christmas period and throughout the New Year and keep these pubs alive and kicking.

The Castle Inn

The Castle Inn is a Grade II Listed building and according to its English Heritage listing, the Castle is an "Inn C16 or earlier, altered C18 and later with outshut at rear. Timber framed of 5 bays, roughcast and colour-washed. And other additions in the C19th."

It started life as The Church House, then became the Bunch of Grapes at the end of the 18th century, evolving eventually to the Castle Inn. it is the only Free House in the village and is owned by a charity, CHC-





Church House Charity, with Matt & Helen Brown the current lease holders. CHC was set up as a charity independent from the Church of England with the purpose of maintaining the fabric of St Nicholas Church and supporting Christian outreach for the ecclesiastical Parish of Hurst. Lease payments from the Castle Inn provide the monies for CHC to achieve its mission.

Elephant & Castle



The Elephant & Castle public house dates back to the mid 19th century, with the first record entry being for a Mr Henry White (Billings Directory), in 1854, although it is thought a licence was granted earlier than this.



The Green Man

The Green Man in Hurst is a fine example of a Traditional English Country pub with an exten-

sive beer garden. It was awarded its first license in the 1600's and have been serving thirsty travelling tradesmen and villagers ever since.

Hurst Village Pubs - A Rich History Page 2

Jolly Farmer



Along with the Wheelwright Arms, locals were well catered for with the opening of the Jolly Farmer in the mid 19th century. The first entry found is for a Mr James Allum - Beer Retailer and Farmer in 1854—Ref Billings Directory.



The pub was closed briefly in 2012, due to a fire when a gas cooker in the kitchen caught fire. Fortunately there were no casualties. The Jolly Farmer recently underwent extensive refurbishment under the direction of new manager Mike Cobb.

The Warren

The name is derived from Warren House, the name of the farm that stood on the site as early as 1681. In turn the farm probably took its name from a medieval rabbit warren, which is thought to have existed; owning a warren was then a privilege.




The first known reference to the building as a public house is in an advertisement in the Reading Mercury of 15th November 1777, which announced a pigeon shoot "at the Warren House.

Its name has varied more than that of any other public house in the Wokingham district. After the change to the New Warren House in 1817, it changed back to simply Warren House before 1820, only to become the Warren Inn by 1824. In the 1830s and early 1840s it was known as the Warren House, only to become the New Warren House by the 1850s. Today it is once again the Warren after a short and, locally unpopular, time as The Bullfinch.

Wheelwright Arms

This 19th century Wheelwright's shop started selling beer when the railways arrived in the early 1850s. Wheelwright William Pither started to sell beer here to supplement his income when trade declined. He benefitted from the closure of the nearby Victoria Arms





the outside chimney stack provide clear evidence of an historic building. Daryl and Katie Cooper look forward to welcoming you.

Since 2000, a quarter of pubs have closed in the UK, totalling more than 13,000 locations. Nearly 400 pubs closed their doors for good in England and Wales in the first half of 2023, almost as many as the whole of 2022.

Happily, our pubs are generally well patronised from within Hurst and by visitors from further afield. Recently, Covid and the cost of living crisis have not helped these pubs to keep running - let's keep ours alive and active!

Hurst - A Host of Wildlife Awaits You

Rare Breed Born in Hurst-Look at Him Now!

In our Spring/Summer edition we reported on the unexpected birth of a Suffolk Punch foal—then unnamed. He has since been named Danny Boy.

Hurst resident Danny Boy is now 5 months old and growing fast. He now measures circa 12.3 hands in height, about 250kg in weight. He is very much a handful now and still has a lot of growing to do.




Typically, young Suffolks with a "bum high close couple appearance" will grow upwards before they grow out. At his current growth rate, Danny Boy will be bigger than his father by some degree. Watch this space for further updates!



Other Rare Species in Hurst

The "wet" woodland habitats at Sandford Mill Copse and Lodge Wood are reputed to support 10% of the UK's population of the **Loddon Lily**. Lodge Wood is designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest for this reason.










The lakes at Dinton Pastures Country Park and the Lavell's Wetland Trust attract a variety of wetland birds. One of the rarest visiting birds is the **Bittern.**



The lakes are also important for insect life with a considerable population of varieties of **Dragonfly**.



Hurst has over 30 ponds in the Parish and these have a wide variety of wildlife, including the rare and internationally protected **Great Crested Newt**.







Hurst - A Host of Wildlife Awaits You in Dinton Pastures

Life—but we may not be aware of it!

It's good to see the highland cattle still grazing in the Dinton Pastures meadows.

Conservation grazing is important - grazing animals do two things:

- They tend to eat the lusher plant species, which in turn gives a competitive edge to the finer plants and flowers.
- They uptake nutrients such as nitrogen and phosphorus, preventing them from being recycled into the soil again.

 This recognition along the property of the sound of the soil again.

This means that more aggressive plants cannot invade and displace the rare plants which thrive in low nutrient conditions.



As we've reported in the Lavell's Wetland Trust update, bitterns have started to re-appear in the reedbeds and are being seen on a regular basis on Lavells Lake.

For the first time since 1984, a pink footed goose has been seen in the park which is of huge significance amongst our resident bird watchers.




The team at Dinton Pastures has carried out a fish survey on the Emm Brook at Lavell's Lake.

This was a two part survey which included an electro fishing survey of the river to see what species we could find, and also a DNA survey which was carried out by Reading University to see what species they could identify as present.

The species found were:

Chub, Bream, Perch, Pike, Roach, Tench, Minnows, Gudgeon, Stone Loach, Bullheads and sticklebacks - shown below in order.



The species the team hoped to find (they know they are about) are River Lamprey and Eel. However, DNA results are awaited to confirm these, as none were found in the 100m stretch surveyed.

Lavell's Wetland Trust—A Nature Reserve in the Heart of Hurst

Do you know where Lavell's Wetland Trust is?- or what it is all about?

Lavell's Lake, set to the North of Dinton Pastures, is the centre of Lavell's Wetland Trust (LWT: registered charity 1176960) is in the northern most part of Dinton Pastures Country Park (DPCP) and set in about 46 acres of a mixture of managed wetland habitats, including Phragmites reed beds, sedges, grass areas, coppiced scrub and hedgerows.

Lavell's Lake has a rich biodiversity, but the key focus is wetland birds, such as dabbling ducks, waders, herons, bittern, egrets, rails and crakes and reed dwelling passerines. Two public hides have been built overlooking shallow water. Both hides provide some of the closest views possible of numerous shy and secretive species.

North of Lavell's Lake along the Loddon footpath, is Lea Farm Lake, which is about a third

longer than Lavell's, but probably more than three times the area of water. A hide has been built offering exceptional views across the lake.

LWT are some way along with the reed transplanting, although the summer floods hampered progress to some degree. Final costings are being prepared to build the landfill viewing station and hope to have this built before year end - helped by a generous donation from HVS.

The summer is over, the last few Swallows, House Martins and Warblers are on their way and the winter birds have begun arriving, many of the duck species have been building numbers for over a month, but the Redwing, Fieldfare, Siskins, other finches, greater wildfowl numbers and of course many Gulls, are yet to arrive. Each winter we hope we will yet again be blessed with Bittern at Lavell's and White Swan Lake – they usually arrive in early November and are a speciality that our area has become famous for.







Leave the Car at Home - Catch the Bus

Replacing car journeys with public transport can help reduce CO2 emissions by 42% if using the bus and 73% if travelling by train. It all helps with creating a cleaner, greener environment.

We all need to consider ways of reducing our own carbon footprint. Why not consider taking the bus? A walk at either end of our journey will also help towards our steps count.

In Hurst, we have the option of Bus Routes 128 and 129 to travel either in the direction of Wokingham, or towards Reading. For those of you commuting out there, the 128 stops at Twyford station, and this is a great advantage given the challenging parking conditions at the station and throughout Twyford.

Recycling—something everyone can do to play their part.

Information on recycling options in Wokingham Borough Council (WBC) can be found online: www.wokingham.gov.uk/rubbish-and-recycling

In WBC there are many other options for recycling items not collected by WBC's kerbside collections:

- Donate clothes, shoes and furniture to charity shops (many will collect larger furniture items)
- Drop clothes and shoes to clothes banks—there are many in the Borough
- Use the freecycle network to give away your items https://www.freecycle.org/
- Use Facebook groups such as "Don't Dump It" and Marketplace for your area
- Glass/Bottle banks are available at most supermarkets and at Dinton Pastures, the Green Man and The Castle Inn.

Other items that are not generally recycled throughout the borough do not have to be put into landfill. Ali's Recycling, in conjunction with Terracycle - a global company dedicated to the idea of zero waste - provides information on where items such as crisp, biscuit, pet food and other packaging can be recycled. HVS Invests in a new viewpoint at Lavell's Wetland Trust

With funding from HVS, LWT is eagerly awaiting the start of a weekend project to build a view point overlooking the landfill from the bottom of Lavell's car park field. The view point will provide a simple means to both shelter from rain and wind, and somewhere to rest and linger for longer periods, as it is through a prolonged stay that one can really witness the movements of across a range of bird



species, from birds of prey, to wildfowl, to herons, egrets, to finches, pipits, thrushes, swallows and martins and numerous other passage birds, not least wading species. Watch this space for more information on this project.

Diana Brimblecombe Animal Rescue

At the HVS AGM in May, Donna Penfold from Diana Brimblecombe Animal Rescue Centre (DBARC) gave a very informative presentation on DBARC, where they rescue and rehome Cats, Dogs, Rabbits, Guinea Pigs and other small animals and birds. Covid had a massive impact, leaving them unable to fundraise. DBARC relies solely on donations and fundrais-



ing . The drop in income, while costs of caring for the animals stayed the same, created some severe challenges for them.

Planning Update

All planning matters being dealt with by HVS, together with any associated correspondence, are regularly updated on our website (www.hvs.org.uk/planning), and also in our regular e-mail newsletters*.



Land at Broadcommon Road, Hurst (Planning Application No: 223805)

This second planning application for the erection of up to 30 self build dwellings was refused by Wokingham Borough Council. The main reason for refusal given by the Planning Authority was "Due to the site lying outside of the settlement boundaries and it represents inappropriate and unsustainable form of development in the countryside with a loss of the separate identity of Hurst and scattered development to the South, and harm to the quality of the environment."

Proposed Erection of a 15m Telecommunications Mast on Broadcommon Lane (Planning Application No: 222846)

This second application which, having been refused by Wokingham Borough Council, was the subject of an Appeal by the developers. The appeal was subsequently dismissed by The Planning Inspectorate. The proactive involvement of local residents in this matter is gratefully acknowledged.

Land Adjacent to School Road and Orchard Road (Willowmead Field, Planning Application No: 230074)

At the time of going to press, this application—despite being submitted to Wokingham Borough Council, and registered by them on 9th February 2023—has yet to be determined.

Wokingham Borough Council Local Plan Update

The Local Plan Update (LPU) replaces the adopted Core Strategy and Managing Development Delivery Plans, setting out the Spatial Strategy for the Borough up to 2040, showing where and how much growth can happen across the area, setting rules for managing development and what sites can be developed. The LPU will be completed and adopted between 2023 and 2026.



A new Statement of Community Involvement, setting out how the Planning Authority will engage in the preparation of Local Plans and assessing planning applications, will be adopted. A new Community Infrastructure Levy charging schedule, i.e. a charge which can be levied on new development to help deliver the infrastructure needed to support growth, will also be adopted.

Indicative Programme for the preparation of The Local Plan Update:

- Proposed Submission Plan Publication November 2023
- (NB. It is the Society's understanding that the proposed Submission Plan has to be approved by WDC's Executive)
- Submission March, June 2024
- Examination Hearings (stage 1) August 2024
- Examination Hearings (stage 2) January 2025
- Inspector's Post Hearing Letter April 2025
- Modifications Consultation July 2025
- Inspector's Report of Examination November 2025
- Adoption December 2025 (Having been approved by WDC's full Council).

What potentially will be a 200 page document, the emerging Local Plan will include all the new proposed planning policies, bringing them fully into line with the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF). Wokingham Borough Council is committed to having "good conversations" with the community and stakeholders about the content of Local Plans. It is important that these conversations have the right depth and focus, matching the scale of the issues and proposals being considered. A Government consultation is awaited on amending the NPPF to take into account past oversupply of housing by Local Planning Authorities to set off against future requirements—this could be really important as it could mean anything up to 2,000 fewer houses during the period of the new Local Plan.

Electoral Changes for Hurst

The Boundary Commissions for England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland submitted their 2023 Boundary Reviews in June, presenting their recommendations to the Speaker of the House of Commons on the reorganisation of UK parliamentary constituencies. Out of 650 existing constituencies in the UK, only 65 will remain unchanged.

Since 2021 the Boundary Commission for England has been reviewing all parliamentary constituencies in the country. It's aim was to redraw some constituencies to ensure each area has a similar number of voters.

The proposed changes for Hurst (and Twyford) see them moved from Maidenhead to Wokingham. So Hurst will no longer have Teresa May as MP. Instead John Redwood will represent us, if re-elected.

Changes have also been made to local authority wards to help maintain balance. A **new ward** called **Twyford**, **Ruscombe and Hurst** will be created, comprising Ruscombe, Hurst and Twyford parishes, and represented by three councillors.

These changes come into effect at local elections in 2024.



Dreams came true when The Poets were selected for a BBC Maida Vale session, then the BBC picked them for the BBC introducing stage at the Reading and Leeds festivals, and their solo European and UK tour in 2023 has been a huge success.

They describe their music as Energetic. Indie. Pop. Only The Poets consists of Tommy Longhurst (lead vocals, guitar), Andy (Roo) Burge (bass, vocals), Clem Cherry (guitar, vocals), and Marcus Yates (drums, vocals). They released their first hit, "Ceasefire," in 2017, followed by their catchy single, "Emotional," a few months later and have been

gradually putting out new music, one song at a time, then an EP, and now on October 20th, their first vinyl release, a live album from the 'Feels Like Home' Tour.

I knew who he was and that he was a great bass player, and as soon as his band broke up, I asked him if he wanted to play with me because I wanted to start a band."
